Future Minister Camps

The third year of the Future Ministers Camp Ministry is drawing to a close. I attended future preacher training camps at the Pennington Bend church of Christ in Nashville, TN and at Freed-Hardeman University when in High School. I have had the privilege of participating in such camps across the US for over 30 years. The dream of starting camps in Latin America began around 2008 or 2009 after several trips to Panama with the Graymere church of Christ in Columbia, TN. The need for the camps was confirmed by the research I did while working on my dissertation. The urgency for the camps arose from a request in 2010 from Francisco Gonzalez and Alonso Racine to come and help them start a Future Ministers Training Camp in Panama. My move to Henderson to teach at Freed-Hardeman University allowed me some time in my schedule to travel to Latin America. The first camp was held in January 2011 on the campus of the Bible School of the Americas in Panama as a joint venture of the Graymere church of Christ and the Forrest Park church of Christ. Since that time, God has allowed us to participate in coordinating or teaching at twelve camps in seven different Latin American Countries: Panama, Costa Rica, Peru, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador, and Guatemala. A total of 97 campers attended the four camps that were held this year in Nicaragua, Honduras, Guatemala, and El Salvador. Most of the boys who come to the camps are members of the church but there are usually a few younger boys who are not. Thus, we average a baptism per camp (4 in 2014).

The camps have become feeders for various preaching schools in Latin American and even the States. I was recently invited with my friend Chuck Morris (who has helped with all but one of these camps) to speak at a new camp in Guatemala. The camp was hosted by a preaching school and the four counselors were students at the school. Three of the four counselors had attended Future Minister Camps in other countries (Costa Rica & Honduras). I teach a short course at the Bible School of the Americas each March. I had two students in my class last March who had attended the Future Minister Camps in the past (Honduras & Nicaragua). Four of the fifteen men who sent in applications this year to attend the Bible School of the Americas in 2015 have attended one of the camps (El Salvador & Honduras).

The camps are generally for young men ages 12 to 24 that are active participants in their local congregations (though

we have had young men as old as 30). The camps focus on motivation and training in teaching God's Word and leadership in the church. The following classes are taught at each camp:

1. Class on the Eldership: The Importance of Elders/ Soul Shepherds

2. Preparation and Delivery of Sermons (3 classes).

3. Leading in Worship (Singing, Praying, Scripture Reading, Lord's Supper).

4. Personal evangelism (2 classes).

Following classes are taught on a rotational basis.

1. Being a Leader in Your Youth Group

2. The Importance of Relationships.

3. The Life of the Preacher.

4. The Preacher's Family.

5. Leading Like Jesus.

6. The Sermon on the Mount.

We also have motivational messages at each camp that are designed to motivate them to share God's word with others. Every camper is given a Thompson Chain Reference Bible and at least one other Bible study book. We have found that the boys do not have access to Bible study tools so getting them these Bibles is important to not only help them prepare their sermons during the camp but to their being able to continue to prepare sermons when they get home. Each young man prepares and preaches an 8-minute lesson during the camp. We also have a graduation ceremony at the end of the week.

Our plan for the camps is to work with the local brethren to conduct the camp for two years and then for them to keep the camp going. Brethren from the States help with the camp but local brethren do much of the work. A local coordinator handles all applications and works with me to plan the camp.

train up a
CHILD

I KNOW you have heard many people say, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it (Prov. 22:6)." "And you, fathers, do not provoke your children to wrath, but bring them up in the training and admonition of the Lord". (Eph 6:4) But, what does training call for or entail?

Children are a blessing given by God that bear His image and we will be held accountable on how we bring them up. God gave the nation of Israel the charge in the Old Testament to teach their children and the New Testament brings that same charge to us. As Christian parents we understand that charge, but what about those who did not obey God's command. What happens to those children that are NOT being brought up in the Lord?

WHAT HAPPENS TO THOSE CHILDREN **NOT** BEING BROUGHT UP IN THE LORD?



The Children's Home was started to help solve this problem in part and fulfill the command from our Lord when He said in Matthew 28:19-20. "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age. Amen." We accomplish the first command of going out and making disciples, by teaching these children in our care about our Lord. We have had an effect on the children in the Home. As we teach, some are looking to the future and how they can work in the church. The children in our care will be future Elders, Deacons, preachers and Bible teachers helping to grow the Lord's church in Panama.

Now, as we teach the Gospel we have to give them the right example as their substitute parents. Dear Abby once printed the “Parents Prayer”,

“Oh, heavenly Father, make me a better parent. Teach me to understand my children, to listen patiently to what they have to say, and to answer all their questions kindly. Keep me from interrupting them or contradicting them. Make me as courteous to them as I would have them be to me. Forbid that I should ever laugh at their mistakes, or resort to shame or ridicule when they displease me. May I never punish them for my own selfish satisfaction or to show my power.

“Let me not tempt my child to lie or steal. And guide me hour by hour that I may demonstrate by all I say and do that honesty produces happiness.

“Reduce, I pray, the meanness in me. And when I am out of sorts, help me, O Lord, to hold my tongue.

“May I ever be mindful that my children are children and I should not expect of them the judgment of adults.

“Let me not rob them of the opportunity to wait on themselves and to make decisions.

“Bless me with the bigness to grant them all their reasonable requests, and the courage to deny them privileges I know will do them harm.

“Make me fair and just and kind. And fit me, Oh Lord, to be loved and respected and imitated by my children. Amen.”

We can only do this with your Prayers and financial help. Do you think that maybe you are the answer to that part of their prayer? Proverbs 21:13 states, “Whoever shuts his ears to the cry of the poor will also cry himself and not be heard.”

Most of the staff and counselors are local brethren. Ladies (and sometimes men) in the host country often pitch in and handle the cooking for the camp. The teaching is divided between local brethren and "Gringos" from the states. It is common to have 3 or 4 brethren from the States at each camp. The most frequent helpers from the States have been Chuck Morris, Cody Childers, and Jon David Schwartz. Phil Waggoner played a key role in the camps in El Salvador and Honduras and John Farber played a key role in the camp in Nicaragua. It is also becoming more common to have someone at each camp that had participated in a camp in another country. Minor Perez, Jr (Costa Rica) and Isacar Racine (Panama) have done this on the most frequent basis. Panama now runs their own camp each year (at the Bible School of the Americas) and Costa Rica will start running their own camp in 2015 (at Camp Jenny Sue).

It takes an army of workers and supporters to make these camps work. Here are our biggest needs related to the camps:

1. Prayers for the work.
2. Elders - I would love to have an elder at each camp to teach the elder's class.
3. Financial Support:
 - a. Cost of Bibles/Books (typically \$1,000-1,400)
 - b. Overall Camp Costs: food, lodging, supplies, etc. (typically around \$7,500)
 - c. Kirk's Travel Expenses (approximately \$1,200 per trip).
 - d. Support for young men from the camps who want to attend the Bible School of the Americas (\$950 per month for full scholarship).
 - e. Kirk's yearly support
4. Help getting the word out. The more who know about the work the better.

A host of individuals and congregations have contributed to my support and to this work. We have had as many as 16 different individuals and congregations contribute to a camp. It is a little easier when a congregation will take on support of a specific camp. The Calvert City congregation in Kentucky, for example, supported the two camps in Nicaragua. An individual from the Crosswinds congregation in Tennessee gave the funds for this year's camp in El Salvador. The youth group of the Winfield church of Christ in Alabama raised the funds for the camp in Honduras that was held in January (our largest camp with 36 campers). Ken and Jozada Smith (McMinnville, TN) bought the Bibles for two of this year's camps.

GUEST EDITORIAL

Traveling abroad on international outreach can be an exciting experience. But what would happen if you or one of your family members became ill or injured while away from home? Many international travelers assume they will be covered for illnesses and injuries while abroad.

The truth is your domestic insurance plan may not travel with you or it could be severely limited in handling your international medical needs. Without even realizing it, you may be putting your health - and that of your family - at risk.

What if you are injured or become ill during your trip? Could you obtain quality treatment at an unfamiliar hospital? How would you deal with language and currency barriers? What if the treatment you need isn't available nearby? Who do you call? Imagine trying to contact your insurance company at 3:00 a.m. from a foreign country during a medical emergency. Will they be there when you need them the most? Even if they are available, would they have staff that would be equipped to manage a medical emergency on your behalf? Do they have a medical team on call that is versed in discussing a medical emergency with a medical provider on the ground in a foreign location? Or would you or a loved one be left to manage events on your own?

An Emergency Medical Evacuation can easily become an expense costing thousands of dollars.

Without the right insurance coverage, who will pay for this expense? If you were to die overseas, who would coordinate and pay for the return of your remains back home? Repatriation can be very costly and it's highly unlikely that your domestic plan would pick up this expense.

All of these questions are legitimate concerns that one can readily address with the purchase of an international medical insurance plan. Whether you are traveling overseas and need short-term medical coverage or you intend to reside overseas and require medical insurance that will cover you worldwide including visits to the U.S. while on furlough, being prepared is a **MUST**.

We have teamed up with Watts Insurance to include the cost of this insurance to the Shared Team Expense of each campaign.

Change Your Mind... Change The World by Tommy Tidwell

I had the privilege of going on my first mission trip (at the age of 53) this year, and I was blessed to be able to go with Spencer Broome and the Latin American Missions YESII campaign to Costa Rica. Here are a few lessons I learned.

Before this trip, I was highly skeptical of the idea of short term mission trips. I thought it was a lot of money “wasted” with little tangible results. I had the idea, as some others have voiced, that the only ones baptized were those who had been baptized before, or did it because some American missionaries were there, to make the numbers and the work “look good.” Boy, was I ever wrong, and I repent with all my heart that I had these attitudes.

As a preacher I needed this, because sometimes working in the United States, with its political correctness, and seeming hard-heartedness, can be hard. To be able to knock “gates” and find people that will allow you to come in and study the Bible on the spot was magnificent. To know that you could still do this and make an impact that you can see is what many preachers need to see. To know that God’s word will still work if we simply teach it is life transforming – it is sad that many times we don’t see it enough to encourage us in the United States.

As an elder, I was impressed with the organization that Spencer Broome adds to the campaign, and to know that he has “been there, done that,” helped me to appreciate the work that the Forrest Park congregation has engaged in for years. Also, as an elder, I see the need as never before to support missions both inside and outside the United States. In a day when congregations are cutting their mission budgets to support works at home, I am convinced that we are going at it the wrong way. We need to see the “world” – and not just our little section of it – but the whole world view before we will get to work even in our “little world.”

Spencer helped me tremendously through the week I was there! From battling through homesickness (yes, I did) to helping me remember how to approach doors (it says a lot that I haven’t knocked doors in so long that making the approach was hard for me – I wonder how many others could and should say the same) he was always there to encourage and strengthen me in the work.

Going on this mission trip changed my life! I thank the Forrest Park Elders, the L.A.M. workers with the Forrest Park church, and the brothers and sisters, young and old, who went on this trip. The camaraderie, the fellowship, the joy I experienced overcome all of my reservations and doubts. I look forward to going again next year, if God wills, and trying to encourage all I can to go as well. And, as an elder and preacher, you have my 100% support, prayers and good will as I am now a firm believer in short mission trips, and mission work in general.
