Blessings in Giving

I've often wondered what it would be like to "time-travel" back to the very early days of the existence of the Lord's Church, soon after the Day of Pentecost. It might do us all a lot of good to live for a day in Jerusalem in the setting of Acts 4:32-35. *"And the multitude of those who believed were of one heart and of one soul; neither did anyone say that any of the things he possessed was his own, but they had all things in common...Nor was there anyone among them who lacked: for all who were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the proceeds of the things that were sold, and laid them at the apostles' feet; and they distributed to each as anyone had need."*


From these verses it appears the early Christians had a healthy attitude regarding their earthly possessions. Apparently, they understood that what they had really belonged to God. Thus, they viewed what they were blessed to possess from the perspective of a stewardship. When we begin to see ourselves as stewards, or caretakers, of that which really belongs to God, we too can put selfishness behind us and truly **grow in the grace of giving**. We are here to be good stewards of what God already owns.

It's the will of the Lord that we be a "giving" people. Paul said in Acts 20:35, *"I have shown you in every way, by laboring like this, that you must support the weak. And remember the words of the Lord Jesus, that He said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'"* Christians aren't just commanded to give in order to reach goals or to meet a budget. In 2 Corinthians chapters 8-9, Paul gives us Heaven's perspective on giving out of a willing spirit and a cheerful heart. It's considered to be a "grace," and a means of proving "the sincerity of your love" (2 Cor. 8:6-8). **When Christians develop this grace, budgets will, in fact, be met. More importantly, the needy will be cared for. The Gospel will be preached throughout the world. God will be glorified.**

God's shovel is so much bigger than ours. No matter how much we give, God exceeds our gifts with blessings from Heaven. Read carefully 2 Corinthians 9:6-8. *"But this I say: He who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that you, always having all sufficiency in all things, may have an abundance for every good work."*



Native Preachers *NEED* Your Help

A caring missionary shares the day-to-day struggles and sacrifices made by native preachers when their financial support is cut or not fully funded.

In December of 2010, I took my first trip as a member of the Latin American Missions Staff. Dave Huffman, Phil Waggoner, and I traveled to Nicaragua to meet every preacher in country that LAM supported. That trip was a whirlwind since we didn't have much time to spend with each man and not able to visit each church building.

I was nervous! I felt like it was my first day at a new school and I wanted all the kids to like me. My message to each of the preachers was this... You may not feel like anyone else cares, but I am here to care about you and your family. Over the past six years, I have tried to honor those words.

Sometimes they need me to care about the holes in the roofs of their houses. Sometimes they need me to care about the need for a bathroom in the church building. Sometimes they need me to care about getting evicted from a rental building or home. Sometimes they need me to care about the loneliness they feel. Sometimes they need me to care about the burden on their heart as a preacher in a difficult place. Sometimes they need me to care when they have been robbed or threatened. Sometimes they need me to care about one of their children who is sick. Sometimes they need me to care about their financial status when their salary funding has been reduced or lost. Sometimes they need me to care



about their family when a family member leaves this world to meet their Savior. Sometimes they need me to care about their spiritual health when they are living in sin.

These preachers need me to care!


And I try...I pray. I pray a LOT! Sometimes I pray with them. I try to take these needs before the One who can actually do something. And after I pray, I start searching for the answer to these prayers. I become the mouth piece for these men and their struggles, their fears, their pain, their victories, their triumphs, and their successes. Sometimes, I tell you about them; not just the random/faceless "you". I mean YOU... the one reading this article now. I bring these cares to you, because I hope that you want to help. I want you to be the answer, sent by God, to my prayers.

When we ask for a dollar, every penny of that dollar goes to these men and their families. Every dollar goes to find the next soul in need of the gospel.

So...what do you say? How about being an answer to prayers today. I've been looking for you...Praying for you to hear the call and answer.



Make Your EOY Donations Work for You and LAM!

charitable organization resulting in a tax free distribution that also may satisfy the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). The donation must be a direct IRA distribution to LAM and the distribution must be taken on or before December 31st of the current tax year.

The preferred method to complete a QCD is with a check to ensure the donation is handled and reported properly. If a QCD is used as the source of the donation, the donor will receive a tax benefit when there, otherwise, would not have been one due to the use of the standard deduction. For those who pay taxes on a portion of their social security benefits, the income for determining the taxation of benefits is lower than if the IRA holder had taken the RMD potentially reducing taxation.

As with all tax saving strategies, it would be best to consult with your CPA, Financial Advisor, and Estate Attorney to make sure your year end financial move makes sense.

As we enter the latter part of 2016, our attention may divert to holiday travel planning, fall festival activities, and your favorite team’s football schedule. One important timely item to think about is donating to Latin American Missions. Many may not be aware of the tax advantages of giving to IRA qualified organizations such as Latin American Missions.

When a cash donation is given to LAM a deduction is allowed on your tax return for the donation thus lowering your tax bill. The maximum deduction allowed is 50% of your adjusted gross income (AGI) which is your total income minus any adjustments. Charitable donations in excess of the deductible amount may be able to be carried forward five years for deductions in future years. Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) were originally a provision of the Pension Protection Act of 2006. Congress and the President approved tax extenders legislation which permanently extended PCDs from Traditional and Roth IRAs.

IRA holders over the age of 70 years 6 months have the opportunity to withdraw up to \$100,000 annually from their Traditional or Roth IRA and deliver the funds directly to a qualifying

Two New Staff at the Children's Home

Recent issues of this Newsletter have dealt with various cases in which children come to the Children's Home in Panama. Perhaps, as you read about these children you did not think about the "mental baggage" they bring with them and the weeks, months, and even years needed to diminish the size of that baggage. What each child brings is different in size and level of difficulty to remove. Some may never be able to forget what was done to them from those they trusted and loved.



The Republic of Panama is now recognizing the need for these children to receive specialized care in order for them to overcome their past and look to the future with hope.

When each of us helps a little, it goes a long way!

The cost for these two new staff members is \$1,000 per month, which was not in our 2016 budget, thus the need for you to help LAM and take some action. Either you can read about these precious children and say, "Oh, well. It's not my problem!" or you can take some action and help us fund this shortfall in the budget. Please remember what Proverbs 21:13 teaches us... *"Whoever closes his ear to the cry of the poor will himself call out and not be answered."*

I had my safety net. Will you help us continue being the safety net for these children?



A new law has been enacted stating that every children's home, orphanage, or child care facility must have a **psychologist** and **social worker** on staff. This much needed care comes with an increase in salaries and has added another financial burden on LAM as we endeavor to care for these children who have been thrown away in society, but whom we gladly accept.

One boy who came to us watched his mother die. Can you imagine the thoughts that are going through his mind? I lost my dad when I was six, but I had my mom and sister there along with other relatives to help me cope with this loss. This boy has no network to assist him BUT US.



Dreams Really Do Come True!

It was the year 2009 when I told the elders of the Graymere church of Christ in Columbia, TN that I wanted to start future preacher training camps in Latin America. I had worked with such camps in the U.S. for over 25 years and believed they could help in other countries as well. The need was confirmed by information gathered while doing research for my dissertation. In the U.S. we have leadership training camps for young people, summer internships in ministry, and programs like Lads to Leaders or Little Timothy and Tabitha classes. I learned that these programs were not as prevalent in other countries, especially in Latin American countries. In January 2010, some brethren in Panama asked **Jonathan Winchester** and me if we would work with them to start a Future Ministers Training Camp in Panama. They felt it could help their young people.

Meanwhile, I transitioned from full-time local work to teaching at Freed-Hardeman University in Fall 2010. After conversations with the elders of the Forrest Park congregation, the Future Ministers Camp ministry throughout Latin America was born. I take two to four workers from the U.S. and the rest are native to the host country. My dear friend, **Chuck Morris**, has assisted in several of the camps in Latin America. We work with local leaders to design and carry out the camp for two years and then ask them to keep it going. So far, God has planted the camps in eight Latin American Countries: **Panama, Costa Rica, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Peru, and Colombia**. Five of these are now hosting their own camps.


The camps target young men ages 12-24, but we have also had men in their thirties to attend. We have classes on preparing and delivering sermons, the eldership, personal evangelism, leading in all aspects of worship, and the life and ministry of leaders and teachers in the Church. We give each participant a Thompson


Chain Reference Bible in Spanish so they will have tools to help them to continue preparing sermons when they go home. Numerous campers who have attended our camps have gone on to preacher training schools and Christian universities in Panama, Guatemala, and the United States.

Rafael Paguaga is a student at the Bible School of the Americas in Panama who will graduate in December 2016. He has also translated for me on several occasions. He is going to work with the school after graduation and is currently enrolled in Greek classes in the hopes of teaching Greek at the campus in Panama someday. One day after class in a short course he was translating for me, he told me something I will never forget. He said, "I want you to know that I would not be here if it had not been for the Future Ministers Camp in my country (Honduras)." He went on to tell me that it was at this camp that he decided to devote the rest of his life to preaching the Gospel. This is why these camps matter.

I need your help! I budget about \$7,500 for each camp plus \$1,200 for Bible and books, and then I raise my travel expenses. If you are interested in helping with the camps, you can send funds to Forrest Park earmarked as "Future Ministers Camps" or "Kirk Brothers Travel Funds." I also covet your prayers for this ministry. They sing songs with them, share a Bible lesson, play games, and just generally love the children. Many of the children barely eat throughout the week. Every week they feed over 75 children. I was able to visit them two years ago and again this year.

Spending time with these children puts tears in my eyes. As soon as you get out of the car, they come and hug you. It is very humbling to look into so many precious faces of beautiful children and think, “Why was I born into my circumstances, and why were they born into their situation?” I never had to wonder where my next meal was coming from. I'm thankful to God for every blessing and to my parents for providing for me. But, it still breaks your heart to see these precious children like this.

I loved being with these children on two Saturdays. I loved singing VBS songs with them,

all the while they were laughing at the large bald-headed white guy doing all the crazy hand motions, faces and gestures. I decided to sit down on the ground a few feet back from the tarp under which the children were sitting.



Next was the highlight of my day. One by one, children got up and came to sit by me. As they colored, they began to use me as their table. Two were using my back, a few my legs, and one girl decided my stomach would suffice. I will not soon forget these children. I always make sure to give them as many hugs as I can. They did

not want to let me go.

I often wish I could have spent a day walking around with Jesus and His disciples on this earth. I'm reminded of all the times that Jesus showed love and compassion for children. I wish I was more like Jesus. I have far too many shortcomings. But, occasionally, I know what it feels like in my heart and soul, to sit down and let the children come unto me. Children are a blessing from God. I'm thankful to God to get to be around some of His precious children.
