LAM is a Ministry of God

Recently, I heard a presentation at PTP on the "Ministry of God, Studies in 2 Corinthians" by Hiram Kemp. His seven points of what God meant to the Apostle Paul and his ministry are particularly meaningful as they relate to our understanding and motivation for our own ministry in the Lord's Kingdom, especially in LAM. When we embrace these points, they will ensure us of not becoming discouraged, ineffective, or losing heart in our service. It will also keep us on a smooth path and out of the ditches, one on each side of the road, as we navigate through our lives of service.

nderstanding that our ministry is the ministry of God, we must avoid the Ditch of Excessive Pride. Excessive pride leaves God out of the picture, either partially or completely, and our bar of success will always run low because we are focused only on what we can do. Our faith in God necessitates a growing faith in our brethren. Because God is the supreme factor in our ministries, success always causes our faith in God and others to grow...unless we are in the ditch of excessive pride. The ditch on the other side of the road to avoid is the Ditch of Low Esteem due to our own pity, fear, and failure. Because God's ministry is not incorporated, it is doomed for failure because God is left out. We fail to see how God can use us even in our limitations. When you study the life of Paul, the Apostle had his own limitations. But in spite of those limitations, he knew his success resided in the fact that his ministry was God's ministry. Paul was God's "workmanship," and the Lord's strength was made perfect in his weaknesses. (2 Cor. 12:9)

Just like Paul in 2 Corinthians, the LAM work is grounded in our faith in God. LAM's success is seen in the seven points found in 2 Corinthians:

- 1) God is our merciful comforter. (1:3-4)
- 2) God delivers. (1:8-10)
- 3) God keeps His promises. (1:20)

- 4) God leads us to victory. (2:14-15)
- 5) God completes us in our suffering. (3:5)
- 6) God strengthens us. (12:8-12)
- 7) God is our source of love and peace. (13:11)

Because of God's presence in the ministry of LAM, we actively communicate our desire for partners and express how we value participation and involvement of others. As we consider the scope of the work in LAM, the mutual conviction and commitment of other members of the Lord's Church are essential in accomplishing the Lord's mission statement. We solicit and instruct men to become ministers in the Kingdom, and we actively encourage them as we support them financially, emotionally, and spiritually in their work because we have faith in them. Because of our faith in God, we want to be accountable in our stewardship and submit to each other as we submit to God. Our goal in LAM is to present Gospel Opportunities for every member of the Lord's body.

herefore, the Forrest Park Eldership welcomes **Rafael Paguaga** to serve in LAM with new

CARY GILLIS, NEW DIRECTOR OF LATIN AMERICAN MISSIONS



was raised in the church. I'm related "Raccoon" John Smith, one of the Cane Ridge Restoration figures, and some of my mom's family goes back even before the Restoration Era. My dad was a preacher, so when I began my college studies Faulkner University, I decided that was the route I was going to go. After graduation

at Faulkner, I went to Freed-Hardeman University for graduate studies. That's where I met Westley Hazel, the current preacher at Forrest Park. Afterwards, I preached part-time and finally ended up in South Texas for the last 13 years. The congregation is bilingual in English and Spanish. There were two ministers, one English speaking and one Spanish speaking. I served as the preacher, a youth minister, and the college minister. Being single, I had an opportunity to take on a role that I wouldn't normally have been able to fulfill. During those years I had several young men who came and lived with me. None of them had good family lives. Most of them didn't have Christian fathers. I was able to provide deep, long term, mentoring opportunities for a lot of young guys in the church.

AM had not been on my radar, but my friend, Miranda Smith, called one day and said, "Hey, I've been on some campaigns, and you have bilingual people there. If you can recruit them, then we'll have more translators and be able to have more evangelizing teams!" I took four translators on our last campaign to Peru in 2019. The church took ownership of the work, especially the ones that felt

they were serving a special role. It's been a cool thing seeing the involvement going with LAM. Partnering with others on the YES II campaigns transformed our congregation. It lit the fire under people, and they returned home totally different. That's something I've witnessed and want to be a part of.

hen COVID hit in 2020, we were planning to go to Panama. We're not a big congregation, but we had nine people going and even more translators than before. Then, Spencer Broome passed away. We were sad and disappointed, and missions were put on hold. A lot of people were anxious to get back to work. Miranda called me up and said, "Hey, let's just do our own campaign; you know, let's go!" That was outside of what I thought was possible. I was kind of a deer in headlights. Then, Westley Hazel contacted me and said, "How would you like to help out with LAM in a more fulltime role?" Knowing how LAM has a track record of helping to transform congregations both in Latin America and in the United States, it really seemed like a no-brainer. It took about 24 hours for me to see the big picture. I thought, "Well, I'm a preacher and that's what I do, but I don't know about this." Then, I realized my fulfillment doesn't really come from being in the pulpit; it comes from saving the lost, equipping people for the work of ministry, and growing the kingdom. I realized that LAM was the opportunity to do that, and I would help bring that kind of transformation, edification, growth, and equipping for evangelism on a larger scale.

t the top of the Latin American Missions' values is creating **Gospel Opportunities** to do the Lord's work, opportunities to take the gospel, and opportunities to be transformed by the Gospel. I know I'll have opportunities to preach as I go along. One of the things I have learned about the big picture of LAM is the Bible School in Panama, and it has a track record of growing congregations. That school produces preachers who go back to their



native homes and plant churches. The campaigns help to jump-start, reinforce, and edify. All that works together to build up the Church in Latin America and in the United States. The big picture is really a beautiful and powerful thing, and I am excited! More specific goals are being dictated by the big picture. For example, one of my tasks is to cultivate a list of faithful men to lead campaigns or to grow into that role. Rather than asking how many campaigns John Farber and I can do in a year, let's ask questions that make sure we're all on the same team and bring campaigns to a higher level.

y Elders want me to fill the role as Minister of Foreign Evangelism at home. I can promote the Forrest Park congregation as a model for missions to other congregations. We're at a point where we want to help others do what we're doing. If we can see a bigger picture of what LAM does, then we can see other congregations replicating what Forrest Park does as the vehicle for LAM. Instead of sending a check somewhere out of a sense of duty, they'll see something that is an effective work and have a direct effect on sponsoring and supporting congregations. Let me show you how you can help build up the Church in Latin America, and I will show you how it's going to help you grow here. I have already experienced that in a small way as a participant in the campaigns.

aving no preconceptions about working with LAM, I don't have in my mind a certain way things need to be done. Being an outsider helps to bring clarity to what's lacking. My goal is to grow

the kingdom, save souls, and edify the Church. My goal is to be effecttive and let go what is not effective. I've been praying about just listening and learning so that I can make good informed decisions.

verybody remembers their first campaign and their last campaign, and the middle ones seem to melt together. I observed something during my very first campaign that made me go, "Oh yeah, I'm in!" I remember it like it was yesterday, but it wasn't me. The

greatest effect I witnessed was from my secretary, Araceli, who went to translate for me. She'd always wanted to do something like that, but never thought she'd have the opportunity. When she got there, she was totally in her element. I saw her fulfilling her purpose in the kingdom in a way that she didn't know was possible.

thing I would share with congregations when I talked to them. What we witnessed on a campaign was the church working at a 100% participation, where everybody had a job to do. They were ALL working, and they ALL wanted to work. When you see that, you realize it is possible to do it back home, too, where you have people passively being a part of the church. Instead, everyone has a purpose, everyone knows what they're doing, and they are happy to do it. No one ever says, "No." Everybody says, "Yes, I'm on board." When you witness the church working at a 100% for the first time, it just changes your whole perception of what you think is possible at a local level.

His smile was unmistakable among the group of students even when covid hit BSA. Eduardo García and wife, Dafne Thalia Jimenez, have three children: Neydy (13), David (10), and Evelin (9). They are living at San Vicente, Chiapas, Mexico. Eduardo is working by himself and experiencing the challenges of being the new preacher in town. "I go to work early in the morning and finish around 2:00 PM," he explains. "Then, I meet with my family, and we start door knocking together to share the gospel with the people."

This year there have been four baptisms and 13 restorations. All are now worshiping God in San Vicente. Eduardo is working shoulder to shoulder with Jaime Montejo (2020 BSA graduate) to spread God's word. Eduardo's vision is to prepare a young man from San Vicente and send him later to BSA to be trained and then continue the work in the area. "There is an older Christian in another town who's offering us a field to construct a building and start a new congregation over there," says Eduardo, "but I won't leave this place without having someone else well trained who can teach the Bible and be responsible to the brethren after I'm gone."

his past June I was blessed to teach a class

on "Christian Evidences" at the Bible School of the Americas. I was extremely impressed by the students and their families. Their competence, enthusiasm, and eagerness to evangelize was a tremendous encouragement! Each day started at 7:30 AM with a student leading a devotional. We then had classes throughout the day and a break for dinner around 5:00 PM. Following dinner we would watch a DVD related to Christian evidences with additional discussion the following day. The students have a very high level of energy which is contagious to say the least!

n previous years before Covid, the Bible School staff arranged seminars at area universities. With reduced Covid restrictions, they hope to be able to do so again in future years. The Bible school students typically arrive at the university at least an hour early, giving them the opportunity to meet university students and staff and to invite them to the seminar or additional Bible studies. The topic of "Christian Evidences" can be very important to university students because that is often the time in

their life when they will be challenged by fake science (such as "Evolution" and the "Big Bang" theories) or other arguments contrived to weaken their faith in God and the Bible.

he staff at the Bible School of the Americas is phenomenal. Francisco makes us teachers feel extremely welcome, even inviting them into his home and providing transportation to and from the airport! Rafael is an exceptional translator, handling very technical subjects with ease. Simeon, Agenor, and others also do everything they can to provide encouragement and make the school as effective as possible for all.



n short, teaching the Christian Evidences class at the Bible School of the Americas was very encouraging and motivating for me! HELP NEEDED TO COMPLETE A BUILDING PROJECT

The Church in Huaral, Peru was started in 2011 with a medical campaign led by Jack Farber. Yens Nima was invited to work with the Church in Huaral in 2012 with the second medical campaign there. The Southwest church of Christ in OKC agreed to pick up Yens' support. He has been the preacher in Huaral since that time. Yens Nima is a graduate of BSA. He is married to Amelia, and they have two daughters. He is the son of Juan Nima and Yolanda. Juan preaches in the Los Rosales congregation in Lima. Yens has two sisters and a brother. Both sisters, Yellmi and Dina, are married to U.S. citizens. Dina's husband is a preacher in South Florida. Yen's brother, Juan Jr., is currently at BSA in his second year.

t hasn't been an easy road. Yens has had to move his family back and forth to Lima several times. His youngest daughter has had many health problems over the years. In 2016 I visited Huaral at Yens' request. I visited the church building where he and his family were living. The building was divided into two sections with three rooms. One section was large and used for worship. The second section had two rooms. One was a 20 x 15 room where the family lived, and the other was used for the children's class. I was asked to visit Huaral because the building was being sold out from under them and they wanted help in raising

money to buy the building. We made a push to raise the money but ultimately fell short.

With the money that was raised, we purchased a piece of property with hopes of building on it one day. That day came in 2019 when a good brother from Alabama contacted me in hopes of funding a building project somewhere in Latin America. I suggested Huaral. I knew the Southwest congregation had money designated for missions, and their missions' deacon wanted to get the building built. We worked to get things going and gathered the money, the building plan, and the contractors. Then Covid hit, and everything stalled for almost two years.

The building was properly started in late 2021 and is roughly 80% done. It has two stories and an accessible rooftop. Yens has done an admirable job with the project, and Amelia has been an amazing help and knows as much about the building as Yens. They have spent nearly \$7,500 of their own money through loans to get the building to where it is now. The congregation has given nearly \$5,000 in materials, food, and services to the building effort.

We have been offered a matching dotation up to \$15,000 to help complete the building. We need your help to get this project across the finish line. Please contact the LAM Offices today! URGENT!
