Clearing the Wi-Fi Clouds Over The Bible School of the Americas

In February of 2021, my son, Ahren, and I were tasked to upgrade and repair the wireless network at the Bible School of the Americas. The current system was inadequate for the needs of both the faculty and students. Access was limited, and the speed was very slow if you could get on at all. The system was plagued with constant outages and damaged system components. Local networking specialists were hired to fix these issues, but they did little to improve the overall capability. This went on for several years until a good wireless network system became a necessity. The COVID pandemic came and online classes became the norm, but communication was extremely hindered by the lack of a reliable system.

The Elders responded and asked if there was a way to make the system accessible throughout the campus with a reliable connection speed. Working with Ahren, a plan was developed. We ordered the needed supplies and equipment, packed anything else we thought we would need, and traveled to Panama. Once on the BSA campus, we went about assessing the necessary changes. We developed a plan to use what was currently in place, strengthen the infrastructure, and broaden the access. Securing the existing fiber cables gave the system greater stability. The lower apartment buildings were connected to the network using a wireless bridge. We planned to place access points so the coverage would benefit as many people as possible. However, we were limited because the building walls were cement blocks with metal reinforcement rods in them. That limited the reach of the signal to a very small area of each building. Since we only had a few of these components, we used them as best we could. Even with these issues, the system was working better

than it ever had, and the speed was better. One of the benefits of the new system is that we manage it over the internet from the United States.

When classes started in March 2022, issues with students not being able to connect to the Internet in their apartments made it difficult to complete their studies. Reconfiguring the system's components helped a little but came short of meeting the needs. An upgrade plan was made to put an access point in each apartment giving everyone connectivity throughout the campus. We ordered as many of the components that were available and received most of them. The missing components were the network switches required to connect everything together. So, in April 2022, we packed up what we had and headed back to Panama.

During the week, we placed an access point in every apartment and in other areas where access was needed. Due to missing the desired switches, we searched the Internet and finally found some that we could use. We ran network cables to each Access Point, installed the switches, and made the necessary system configurations, but connectivity issues to the lower buildings persisted. We discovered that the building had problems with electrical power. To remedy this, we purchased battery backup power supplies. We placed them in each building to ensure stable power was available. Now, the system was fully functional, reliable, and working great. Everyone had access and good speed.

We were able to achieve what we came for, and there are no more WiFi clouds at the school. Having the ability to do this for our brothers and sisters at the school is a great and wonderful blessing for us. **To God be the Glory!**

The Work at LAM is Still Going On!

For anyone who has ever prepared for a first time short term mission trip, there is always a lot of excitement planning the trip. At the present time due to Covid, especially in the Latin American countries, and the ramifications of testing positive and remaining in a foreign country for an uncontrollable period of time, campaigns have been very limited. But, as this issue states, *The Work at LAM is Still Going On!*

- We have seventeen students at the Bible School who are training to become ministers of the Gospel and will return to their native countries for a lifetime of preaching.
- We have 86 preachers in eight different Latin American countries who serve as ministers of the gospel for 52 weeks of the year.
- There are 195 congregations and 372 individuals who are part of our long term mission efforts. These efforts have been affected by Covid, but



the work is still going on. The Gospel is being preached, congregations are growing, and the Lord's body is being strengthened as a result of long term mission efforts of LAM and many faithful congregations.

Although short term missions have been limited, the Forrest Park Elders have chosen to be POSITIVE about the gospel opportunities that remain for us as leaders and faithful members of the Lord's Church. We are excited about additional staffing who will focus on BSA Alumni Relations, existing ministers' support, and campaign preparations. They are needed in order to coordinate and communicate all the progress being done right now and with planning future short term and long term missions. Hopefully, an announcement will be made in the near future.

This Eldership continues to meet with Agenor Rudas and the faculty of BSA, LAM associates, and all teams under the LAM umbrella. We remain committed to preacher training, preacher support, both evangelism and medical campaigns, and benevolence. Charles & Martha Renfro

Why would a man and his wife leave their family in Missouri and move to Valdosta, GA to print Bible tracts and song books in Spanish? To quote Charles Renfro, *"To save one soul, it's worth it!"*

As a young man married to his sweetheart, Martha, and living in Springfield, MO, Charles received four years of training working in a printshop. In the 1960s he earned a little over \$2 an hour to support his family. Life was good, but Almighty God had a greater plan to use Charles in broadening His Kingdom here on earth.

Charles and Martha first met Bob Bryson in the early '70s while attending a Missions Emphasis in Alabama. Charles and Martha took their first trip in 1977, and over the next several years they continued to serve on medical and evangelism missions to Panama, Honduras, and Nicaragua. Bob's vision for Panama was always expanding, and soon he saw another possibility. Printed tracts, Bibles, and song books were a must, but getting everything printed in country became more and more difficult. Then, in the late 1980s, Bob contacted Charles about building a "Printing Ministry" for LAM in Valdosta, GA. Being hesitant at first, Charles prayed steadfastly for guidance and answered the Lord's call. "Leaving a stable life working in a printshop and traveling to churches and individuals to ask for money to purchase equipment and raise a personal salary to begin a printshop for LAM was very humbling," said Martha.

In August 1990 the move was made to Forrest Park, and Charles was given six months to set up the printshop and get it running. Over the next 30 years, hundreds of millions of pages were printed under his guidance. For the local work, Outreach Magazines and the church bulletin were printed and mailed. For international work beginning in Panama and expanding to eight Latin American countries, Spanish materials have been printed and used on hundreds of medical and evangelism campaigns.

At age seventy-eight with six grandchildren and four great grandchildren, Charles is spending more time with family, fishing, and helping his son with bee-keeping.

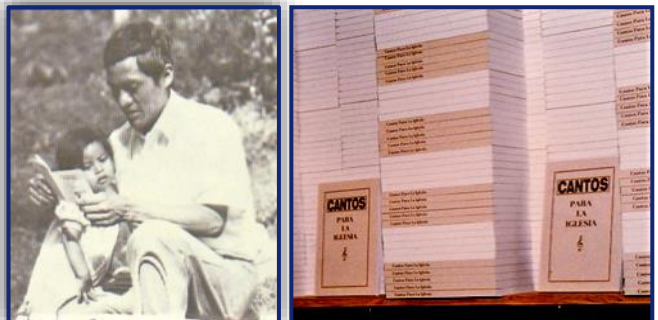

Is it Time for Campaigns Again?

In April 2022 I traveled to Honduras to try to answer this question. My goals were simple.

- 1) Feel the atmosphere of the country. Are things tense? Listen to what people are saying. Are there differences in city versus smaller towns?
- 2) Talk with government officials who can answer if we are even allowed to do a campaign. And,
- 3) Meet with our local brethren to discuss their thoughts on a 2022 campaign.

Feeling Out the Country

I was pleasantly surprised to find Honduras rather normal feeling. There are people and places that are still very sensitive about the COVID-19 virus. Some of the stores and businesses are very strict about wearing masks, and others are not. One church we visited asked us to wear masks, and they sprayed our feet as we entered. That was new for me. Several of the other congregations didn't ask us to wear masks. The world at times is divided over wearing masks. It was encouraging to see that the brotherhood is not divided in Honduras. They were gracious, hospitable, and loving as they work through their own experiences with this pandemic.

Working With the Government

With every medical campaign, we must work with government officials at the national, regional, and local levels to make sure these campaigns go off without a hitch. Each medical professional must be temporarily licensed to practice medicine in the country. Medicines and supplies must be purchased. We met with the Vice-Minister of Health for over an hour. She was extremely gracious with her time. We made our case for having a medical campaign in Monjaras, asked a lot of questions about

the logistics, and asked for recommendations regarding what may have changed since our last 2019 campaign in Honduras. Based on our meeting with them, they gave us every confidence that we have their full support to operate a campaign in 2022!

Talking With Our Brethren

It was wonderful to worship with the body of Christ in four different congregations. On Sunday we went to the church in a neighborhood of Tegucigalpa. I was privileged to preach a lesson. Everyone was kind and welcoming. We worshiped in the afternoon in Zambrano, a small and somewhat new congregation that we hope to help with a campaign in the future. Sunday evening we worshiped with the South Israel congregation and had the privilege to eat dinner with Jonathan Tabora and his family. He is planning to attend the Southwest School of Biblical Studies in August. On Tuesday evening we visited with the San Miguel church in Tegucigalpa. Each congregation is different in their size and facilities, but they all share the fellowship only known by those that love the Lord. Everyone was positive and excited about the future. We also visited the church building in Monjaras and talked with the preacher, **Rudis Ramirez**. He graduated from the Bible School of the Americas in 2017 and is doing a great job in Monjaras. I am excited to get to work with him hosting a Medical Campaign. The facilities at the church building have a big courtyard, high security fence, and a detached home for the preacher.

At the time of this writing, I am reaching out to all medical personnel to see if you are available for this campaign. If we get the commitments that we need, we will work together, hand in hand, with our Latin brethren. **Please keep this campaign in your prayers.**

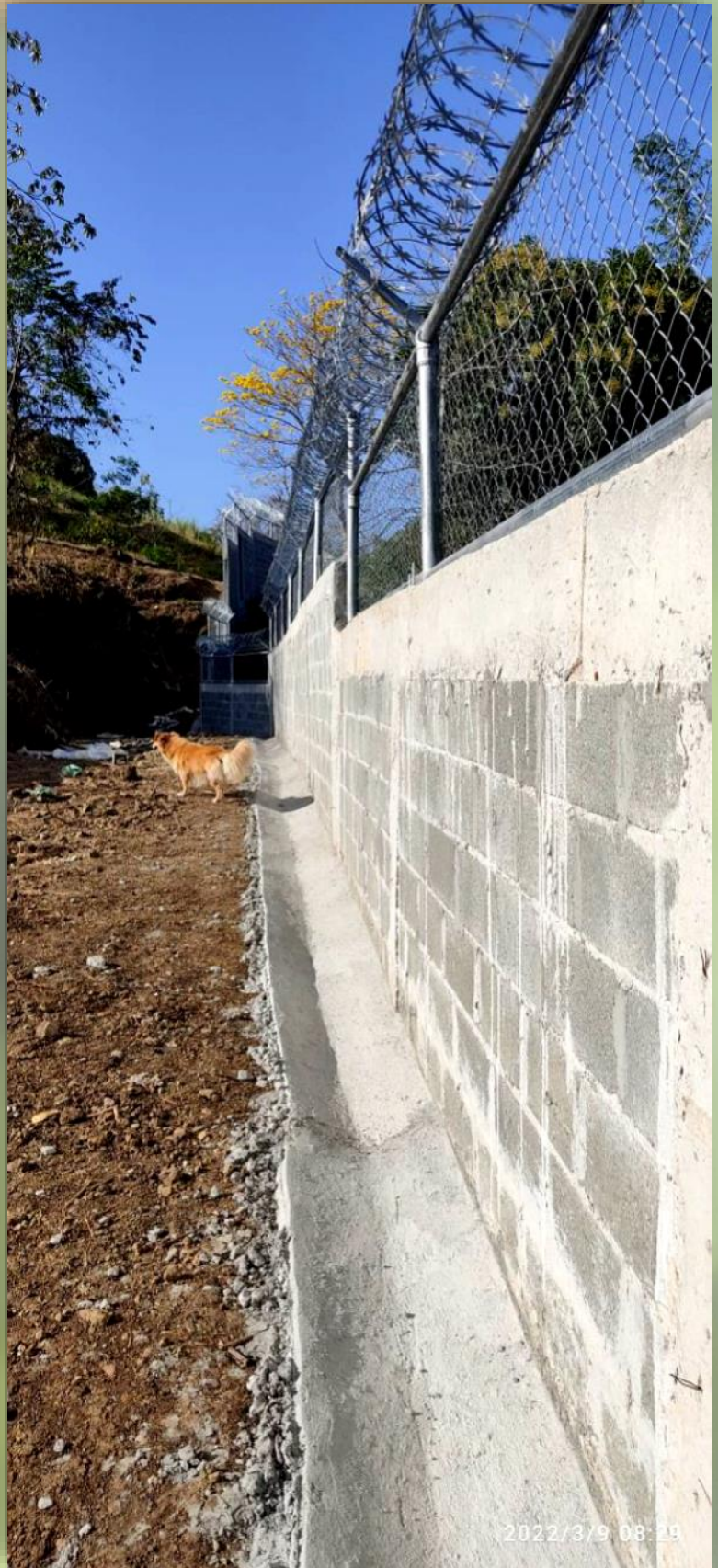

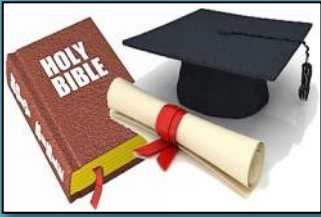

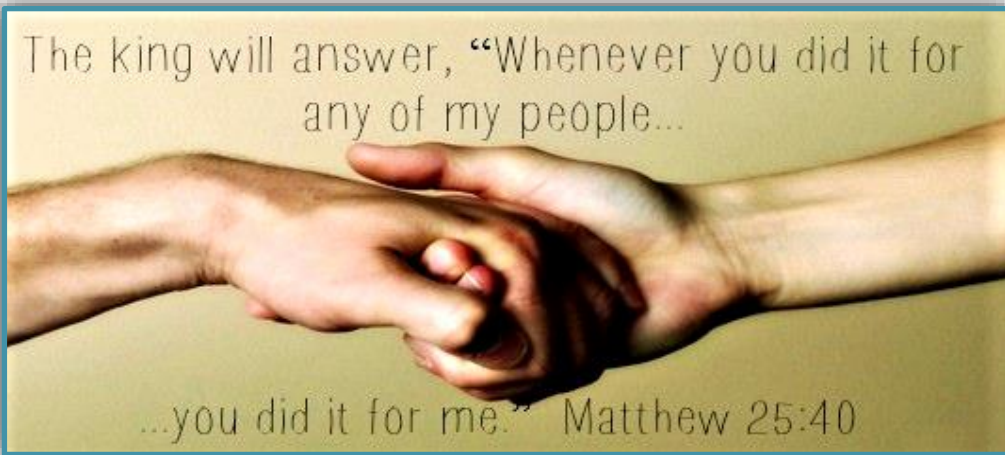
