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The Story Goes Something Like This...

During a recent Mexican lunch and fellowship with Jack Farber, I was surprised when he asked me to write a few words about the beginning of the Children's Home in Panama City, Panama. At first I was hesitant, but with a little encouragement from Jack and so many precious memories which have filled my soul and still bring tears of joy to my life, I surrendered.

One may think the beginning was when the first block was laid, or the first shovel of dirt removed to begin the foundation, or when the first three children arrived from Santiago. The reality is no one event was the beginning. I well remember the time in the early 1990s, Bob Bryson and I were flying home from Panama. Our conversation was always about the mission of the Lord's work in Latin America. Bob was sharing with me a work in Mexico called the City of Children. I asked, "Why can't we do that?" While flying at 30,000 feet, little did we know a dream had been born and would become a reality. The days passed...some would plant, others came and watered, and God surely gave the increase.

rom the tropical jungles of Darien, to the dusty streets of David; over the mountains to Bocas across a bridge at Sixola; up the coast to Limon, Costa Rica over to the unbelievable central valley of San Jose; up the hill of Tilaran over to Masaya, Nicaragua and Chinandega; on to Danli and Manajaras, Honduras to San Agustin El Salvador... Thousands have been added to the Lord. Thousands have had their sick bodies healed by caring and loving hands. Thousands have been fed and clothed, and buildings have been built for worship services from steel and mortar to sticks and mud.

Our hearts were ripped apart when we saw the innocent little children eating from a garbage dump or sitting in our laps on a Medical Team coughing their lives away. Each time our campaign in Latin American came to a close, we would travel home with the image of the cold black eyes of a small child in our minds and hearts, staring at us and watching our every step, hearing but not understanding our words. We came back to the comforts of home, and they returned to their life of hunger, sickness, nakedness, and most of all not knowing the Lord.


We knew we could not care for them all. The dusty streets were filled with dirty feet and runny noses. But we could care for just a few. We could clean their bodies and remove the lice from the heads of just a few. We could destroy the worms in the stomachs and give a home to just a few. We could share Jesus with only just a few.

We began taking steps to make our dream come true. For the first three years, we battled the government of Panama in meeting after meeting, sometimes leaving on a high feeling our dream was close. Then, as quickly as the wind changed directions, we would be right back at the beginning of the vision we had for the children. Alan Lopez set up a meeting and then another. We pressed on, and then one day our dream began turning into a reality!

A judge in Santiago was told of a home built for children but sitting empty, just an empty shell with no life. We received a call from a preacher in Santiago saying, "We have three children for you. Do you want them for just a few days?" What an exciting day that was! But, who would care for them? We needed someone to love them, in other words, give them a home. Alan Lopez who had used his skill in building the first building and setting up meetings with the government said, "Here am I, send me!" Each passing day brought more challenges... schooling with tutors, meals needed to be prepared, transportation for medical needs, clothing and laundry.

There were no shortcuts in developing these young souls which had been placed in our care. The things in this life that are worth having require great effort and a lot of patience. The number of children grew, and the need for others to step up and give of themselves for the children multiplied. There is no question the Lord sent us Miguel and Esperanza as houseparents, and with them the number of children continued to grow. God surely had given us the increase! We are always faced with more children coming, but the hardest decision we ever had was telling those asking for help there was 'no more room in the inn.'


"We are God's Fellow Workers..."




chances are you have heard of "J." Maybe you have read about him in a LAM Newsletter or in some of my posts on Facebook last Fall, or perhaps you have met him personally. In April of 2016, days before turning nine years old, "J" was brought to the Children's Home. I have

never seen a child in worse condition because of the abuse, neglect, and rejection suffered at the hands of family who were entrusted to love and care for him. However, "J's" life changed dramatically on that day in April. That unloved, scared, malnourished, dirty little boy found and began to experience God's love. It was a defining moment in his life.

e began first grade in March of 2017 and loved it! I'm not sure we have another child at the Home who is as social as "J." Everyone in the school knows him although he spends most of the day in one classroom with his small group of classmates.

He enters the school like he owns the place! We learned in that first year "J" learns and remembers information better if it's in the form of a song. He loves to sing.



The 2017 LAM campaign brough Carol Lyn Rhymes on a brief tour of the Children's Home where she saw "J" and said, "We can fix his leg." I knew nothing of this woman, where she was from, what she did, how she could "fix his leg;" but, she was confident and persistent to help "J" have a better quality of life. What a blessing she and her family have been to "J" (and to me).

e missed the third trimester of school last year because he and I went to Shreveport, LA to the Shriner's Hospital where they "fixed his leg."

That was an experience that neither of us will soon forget! I believe this was also a defining moment "J's" life. While we were in the hospital, the Lord's people from throughout the U.S. and Panama covered



us with love. "J" received so many care packages and cards the ladies at the front desk took notice. He received frequent messages from his "papá" (a former housefather at the Home), videos of devotionals at the Home, many visits and gifts from the local church, and visits from friends and brethren who came from Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia. Can you believe a sister from Texas left her own son and came to spend the night in the hospital with "J," a child she did not even know, to give me a night off!?! (That woman was a Godsend!) I cared for "J" much like you would a baby or toddler, bathing him, brushing his teeth, etc., something I imagine he'd never experienced. (That wasn't my plan, but I think it worked out for the

best for him.) He was important to everyone: The nurses, aides, radiographer, etc. stopped to eat his pretend hamburgers and soda while he rode around on the tricycle from physical therapy. The physical therapists barked, meowed, mooed, and clucked back at him during therapy. He laughed and played. Just before returning to Panama, we were at Carol Lyn's home. She prepared a delicious supper, of which he cleaned his plate, twice! Then, "J" had a nerf gun fight with Jason, Carol Lyn's husband, and her youngest son, Cole. He completely forgot about his crutches as he moved about shooting them and laughing contagiously. He was loved.

The year 2020 has brought so much growth to "J," which I believe has come, in large part, as a result of our trip to the United States. Physically, he has grown about an inch and a half since we returned in December. He's actively working on growing a big belly to be like Santa Claus and is disappointed that he's not able to grow a white beard yet! (He was awestruck by Santa.) Recently, while practicing writing numbers, he informed me that "5" is his favorite number because "5" has a "big belly" like Santa Claus. (When I told him how to write it, I said, "You put his hat on, then you draw his chest, and finally make a big round belly.")

is mind is open, and he remembers information more rapidly. At the beginning of the quarantine, I read *Peter Pan* to the children, and although I did not think he was paying attention, he proved he was. A couple of months later, he will tell me his name is *Peter Pan*. "J" is frustrated that he can't read and has the desire to learn. He enjoys doing word searches and can quickly circle the vowels. He has learned the English Alphabet song and sings it with gusto!





is attitude has changed, and "J" is more responsible. He recognizes that he doesn't like to be told what to do and is trying to do things before being directed. Instead of having to be obligated to do therapy with "Coach" (a wonderful 17-year old in the Home), he asks "Coach" to do therapy with him daily. It amazes me to see him so alert and his ability to reason, grow, and develop.


rom my point of view, "J" has had several defining moments in his life so far: the cruel treatment and neglect he endured during the first nine years of his life, his arrival at the Children's Home, and his trip to the United States. Thanks be to God and His people that the last is better than the first! My hope has always been that the Children's Home would make an enormous impact in the lives of the children and teens for whom we care. Principally, I hope the impact is an eternal one. Secondarily, I believe it is important to seek to make this earthly life the best it can be and one that gives glory to God. "J" certainly gives glory to God through his innocence and joy. Perhaps unwittingly, "J" has chosen to let the love of God that he found at the Children's Home define his life. May God be glorified through this child!

Since then, Cook Lisbeth Castillo has made all grocery purchases for the Children's Home every Friday using a special pass given by the Ministry of Health. She is allowed only two hours to be at the supermarket and purchase food items for the next week. Only those top priority items are bought. The remaining





he disinfects everything before it goes into the kitchen of the Children's Home. We used to make those purchases at ease with more time to buy groceries, but now it is very different. Farm Life on the Bible School Campus

ife at the Bible School is fascinating due to meeting new people with different backgrounds. For L those of us who grew up in cities, campus life is completely new. Due to the difficult situation of a pandemic, most of us are gardening because we need to be resourceful, and it is a distraction and good therapy to fight stress.

ost of us know nothing about farming, but Jaime Montejo, a college graduate in agriculture, and IVI Roger Gonzalez, an experienced farmer who lived all his life in the countryside, can get good results when they cultivate the fields. (Both are EBA students on campus now.) Almost all the Bible students helped prepare small plots of soil at the back of their homes. We dug and mixed a fertilizer of ashes from burnt trees to make it softer. Products that have a quicker harvest like tomato, spicy and sweet pepper, cantaloupe, watermelon, and pumpkin were planted. Jaime plants melons, tomato, and corn. He is both a farmer and great brother who assists anyone who asks for help. He has transplanted many plants to the gardens of other brethren. Jaime says fertilizers help with better yields. For example, his melons, once he plants them (without fertilizer), start to give fruit three months later. At times, he can get three or four harvests per year. But with fertilizer, he can get five or six fruits every time and with better quality. Roger is the most active student in the Bible School's agriculture life and is willing to share his knowledge with the brethren. Our instructors, Simión and Francisco, also have some experience in farming. Each has a tomato garden behind their homes. They are not only teachers of the word of God, but also of how to plant edible gardens.

ango is a fruit that abounds on campus, and it has a long growing season. Our 15 mango trees IVI are ready for harvest in April. One just walks around campus to pick mango as needed. Other fruit and plants we enjoy cultivating and harvesting are bananas, avocado, coconut, beans, and yuca. Everyone on the Bible School campus benefits from the sharing of produced crops.

One of the hardest things about coming home from a YES II LAM trip is trying to put the experience into words. There is just no way possible for me to do it. I went on my first YES II trip in 2014, and only my son's summer wedding and a

E ven before "J" and Sarah arrived, the church began to pray for their safe arrival. When those dimples and that smile came through our doors, our congregation fell in love. It was much like our Latin American brothers and sisters greeting us with open arms and hugs and kisses. They love us just because we belong to God's family. And, "J" loved everyone he saw. He learned to say, "I love you," in English, and he meant it

Sarah, too, came in shining the light of Jesus' love to everyone. Her impact on our congregation was amazing because of her contagious and eager spirit to serve God and do whatever it took to worship with His family. She hauled

crutches and wheelchairs and blankets and a sometimes not so cooperative patient back and forth and never missed an assembly while she was in town. Sarah's dedication to "J" and the children at the Children's Home is a perfect portrait of living to serve and not to be served.

asked our congregation to share what impacted them the most about Sarah and "J's" time here. One repeated theme

was how the children welcomed Joshua into class with open arms. They didn't speak the same language, but the smiles and laughter were contagious. A living representation of Matthew 18:3 with the pure and innocent hearts of



children. Sarah and "J" also put a face to our words and reports of the wonderful work LAM is doing for the Kingdom. It was a great reminder of how truly blessed we are here in America and the importance of helping to continue the work of LAM. NEW NORMAL ON CAMPU

The arrival of COVID-19 has turned our activities upside down. Activities that have to do with spreading the

Gospel through teaching of the word of God at the Bible School have been drastically affected. Today, that change has been called by our society and the media as the "new normal." We will be subject to these changes for an indefinite time, and most of all, doing things in ways we had never envisioned. To stop the contagion that increases daily, a quarantine has been established. It has been five months already, and no clear horizon can be seen. The government has established that women can go out on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Men can go out on Tuesday and Thursday. Everyone has only a window of two hours to purchase food.

The growing contagion of the virus has brought us to establish behavioral norms to continue our labors. We have had to invest in a conference room to bring the classes



to the students on the internet. We have to cover our faces with masks and wear gloves when out shop -ping. This is done hurriedly within two hours. Otherwise, one

will face penalties or be assigned to community work. When returning to campus, they must disinfect shoes, clothing, and groceries...ending with a shower before entering their homes to protect their family from the virus.

The brethren guarding the gate of the Bible School have been provided with disinfectants to sanitize the vehicles coming on campus. They use a special liquid to clean shoes and hands, and every person's temperature is taken before entering the campus. Among other changes, we are housing several workers at the Bible School and the Children's Home so they are not exposed to COVID-19 while commuting on public transportation. Implementing this action was of the utmost importance because the children need the support of their tutors in the study room. The children are not attending

school in person. They receive their instruction through modules and on the internet. This makes the tutors' tasks

even more important.

At the end of each day, we meditate about the difficult circumstances we are experiencing. We remember the first Christians who appealed to God when suffering. Today, we have something in common with them. They were threatened by the



prohibition to preach; we are threatened by a virus lurking everywhere. We pray for strength to continue doing the work of preaching and the powerful hand of God to heal our land. (Acts 4:29-30) We pray for the students who have left their countries for two years and come to learn at the Bible School. We pray for the children under our care at the Children's Home. They depend on wise decisions to protect them from the virus. We pray for our families to breathe peacefully when another day goes by and we have not been infected.

Regarding the churches in Panama, we still cannot gather in person. A date had been stipulated for the reopening of assemblies. However, because of the upswing in virus transmission, that possibility now looks farther away. So, we have quickly learned to use social media in order to reach our brethren in their homes. The Church of Christ in Vista Hermosa has not suffered any infection of the brethren, but we have members who have lost their jobs and have no food for their families. We are giving support to these families according to our abilities and capacities. Other



congregations now have some infected members. Companies are dismissing their workers and hunger increases. Hospitals are at maximum capacity with no medical supplies and little medical personnel. We ask

that each of you who reads this report will pray for us. May we continue to always say, "In God there is Hope."




worship with the Margarita Church of Christ on the Atlantic side of Panama with about 80 members. Despite being a small country, COVID-19 spread rapidly with over 78,000 cases and 1,700 deaths. The government took extreme measures to avoid massive deaths. Men and women were assigned days of the week to leave their homes and buy necessary food, and no one is

allowed to travel beyond 30 miles from home. Weekends are completely quarantined, so as of March 16th we have not been able to worship in person at the building. If you get caught by the

police, you go to prison. Rather, we worship via Zoom on the internet.

All flights in and out of Panama were canceled, and all companies were closed by the government. Many brethren lost their jobs, so there was no money for internet service to connect to online worship services. When the quarantine was declared, people had to stay





The Church prepared grocery baskets and school supplies for all the brethren and others in need. Seeing people desperate for food and health services was sad. At Margarita we had eight confirmed cases of COVID-19. Thankfully, all are sound at home. We pray for these conditions to improve quickly and hope to worship together at the building as soon as the Ministry of Health gives us approval to do so. We ask for your prayers that our situation improves and God protects us from getting this virus.

Effects of Covid-19 in Costa Rica

When our first case was reported on March 6th, there were many faces of concern and fear among the brotherhood. As a preacher I prepared sermons of encouragement so the faith of the Church would not fail. False teachers said we were in the final days and it was a punishment from God. Many were preaching apocalyptic messages in order to profit from the calamity. The leaders in the Lord's Church in Sarchi could see our brethren were in danger of being deceived by Satan.

n early April the government took strong measures to prevent mass contagion. Among these measures was the closure of religious buildings, and some brothers felt it was a blow to our constitutional rights. We preachers clarified it as simply a temporary health measure, and not a religious persecution like the first century Christians. We kept the spirits of the brethren up by developing sermons and Bible classes online. We filled the internet with material from the Church of Christ that began to spread among friends and family members who are not members of the church. The Lord blessed us with the means of evangelism and teaching God's Truth to many people.



The government recently announced the opening of religious places with instructions: 1) Wear masks. 2) No bodily contact. 3) No singing

because saliva travels farther. The question arose, how do we worship our God without singing to Him? Again, some saw it as persecution on Christian worship, while others saw only a measure of protection. Some congregations reopened with great enthusiasm, while others remained closed. When the number of confirmed infections and deaths increased, the

government reversed the reopening. Today we are waiting for the government to once again reopen worship gatherings. This pandemic has allowed the Church to awaken to personal evangelism and the development of material now available to the brotherhood. Also, brethren are more willing to share their material goods to those in need. Blessed be God who allows us the strength to overcome the evils of this world.

God's Protective Providence

Jesse shares his story of God's unfathomable providence toward LAM workers during the week of March 8-14, especially Thursday through Saturday. For those three days they faced each obstacle and relied on these words of encouragement, "We are not God. God is God.

And, He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine!"

n March 2nd I traveled to El Salvador with several other Christian brothers and sisters to prepare for a two week LAM Medical Campaign. The small town of San Rafael Cedros was our destination. On March 4th I shared a post by Latin American Missions that no Coronavirus cases had been reported in the Central American countries in which LAM operates. That was 100% accurate at the time of posting. However, on March 9th, we heard rumors that there were reported cases in Honduras and Panama, and the next day we heard there was a confirmed case in El Salvador. On March 11th El Salvador President Nayib Bukele announced the government was sealing off all borders to ground traffic. We had our flights back home scheduled for March 14th, so ground closures didn't seem to be a concern for us. The following day our mission team finished clinic work for the week. We had seen nearly 1,000 patients, completed several hundred personal Bible studies, and baptized thirteen precious souls into Christ who now live in hope of Heaven. The entire community and local government in San Rafael Cedros, El Salvador now welcomes future partnership with churches of Christ and is supportive of the new local congregation of the Church there.



Our very blessed campaign makes the rest of my story 100% worth the risks we were about to go through. Almost as soon as we finished shutting down the clinic and served lunch to everyone, our team was informed by an email from United



Airlines that all flights to and from El Salvador had been canceled, effective immediately, due to Coronavirus concerns. Delta Air Lines was still flying. American Airlines was still flying. But, United Airlines stranded brethren in our group in a third world country with sealed borders, during a worldwide pandemic, while other airlines were still honoring their commitments. When we finally got someone from United Airlines on the phone, we were told they could fly us home...if we could make it to Guatemala City, Guatemala which was a 3.5 hour drive to the north across a closed international border. I had originally flown down with the group that helps prepare for the campaign week, and our return flights on Delta were still on schedule. Our first group flew Saturday morning on their return flight going straight to Atlanta. This was the flight I was originally scheduled for, but as a result of Unites Airline's unfortunate decision, my wife, Lauren, who has a well-managed but lifelong lung condition. would be stuck in El Salvador for a 21 day forced guarantine. She did not have enough prescription to last until the borders were reopened. The gymnasium that had been our medical clinic site for the week became HQ for an extraction operation as our leaders scrambled to come up with a viable plan to get everyone home ASAP. We came up with three different ideas and went to work.

Dr. John Adams worked on possible alternative commercial air transport. Jon White worked on the possibility of a private plane to get us out. I worked with the local mayor on arranging immediate bus transport to the Guatemala border, then changing buses to continue on to Guatemala City in time for our United Airlines flights. David Minton quarterbacked the whole team, making calls and decisions as information came in. Everything about this situation was "fluid", and the rules and information seemed to change about every ten minutes. But, the fact is...God

provided for us in ways we couldn't envision before we even realized what was happening. "We are not God. God is God. And, He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine." As the events unfolded, I witnessed God use Dr. Adams, Jon, and David as instruments of His will. These men are all humble leaders, and I have never felt more thankful for a group of brothers in my life.

This is a story of the power of God's providence in protecting His people. So here we go...John and Jack Farber provided advice from the US and kept up with us as we went through each step and communicated with our travel agent who went above and beyond to help us find a commercial flight. Dr. Adam's wife mentioned to him that he should contact a friend...who put us in touch with the office of Senator Rand Paul. By the same token, John got in touch with Congressman Jim Cooper. Later, I heard they involved Mitch McConnell's office, and collectively they brought us to the attention of the US State Department which tracked us and intervened for us behind the scenes all the way back to the States. "We are not God. God is God. And, He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine."

on White also worked connections and arranged a private plane to fly everyone out, which would have been an expensive option, but God amazingly provided benefactors willing to cover the cost if that had been the only option open to us. Jon also navigated hotel arrangements for everyone in Guatemala City. David Minton provided calm leadership as he directed efforts across all fronts and communicated with everyone. On Friday morning as we were riding in our bus toward the San Salvador Airport, David got a call from the Secretary of State's office. He gave them all our itinerary info, and they said they would make sure we got to Guatemala and had everything necessary to make our connecting flights back to the U.S. Later, we learned that



Guatemala had waited to officially close its borders to foreigners less than two hours after we had arrived. We went through several checkpoints health upon arrival, but were amazed when we pretty much waltzed Customs through and Immigration with barely a glance from the Guatemalan officials. "We are not God. God is God. And, God is able to do immeasurably more

than all we ask or imagine." God placed these brothers and connections where they needed to be in order to provide a path in the midst of uncertainty.

Thankfully, Plan A was what worked out when we were finally able to confirm all new flights for everyone to get from El Salvador to Guatemala City on Avianca Airlines. The incredible generosity of the brothers that stepped up in an unbelievable way to cover the costs of paying whatever was necessary to get everyone safely home blew my mind. The plan was to fly everyone to Guatemala City on that afternoon, and then we would split up into two groups and get everyone on the available United Airlines flights. I was incredibly thankful to be allowed to switch my Delta flights and travel back with Lauren and the rest of the main group. I am beyond words to express my gratitude to God that the only two N95 masks we could find were delivered just before leaving for El Salvador, so we had them available to reduce the risk of exposure to Lauren as we navigated through the airports. I had a lump in my throat as I swallowed back tears of gratitude for God's providence when brother Jon came up to us in the San Salvador airport and said, "You wanna hear some good news? You guys are together on the same flights and will be on the first flight out of Guatemala and the first flight out of Houston tomorrow!" I was extremely apprehendsive by the prospect of navigating through a sea of people through four airports, three flights, over a course of 48 hours to make it back home. I love my wife, and as blessed as she has felt for coming down to meet our Salvadoran brothers and sisters and work with us this last week, I felt terrible for putting her in a position of high risk, even if it was due to the unprecedented circumstances of a global pandemic. "We are not God. God is God. And, He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine."

As Lauren and I safely arrived home and unloaded our baggage, we saw that Group #2 had also made it back. We grabbed a quick bite and crashed in bed. We couldn't believe we had awoken in Guatemala, and now 12 hours later were back in our own bed. I am absolutely inspired by the brethren of Mt. Juliet Church of Christ who went with us to make our campaign a reality, even though their own community and homes had been hit by an F4 tornado less than a week before leaving. I am thankful for their willingness to come and reach the souls that were ministered to, studied with, and that gave their lives to Christ. No amount of adversity we face in this world can offset the blessing and privilege of our call to build up the Kingdom of Heaven. "We are not God. God is God. And, He is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine."

Some of them seemed overwhelming at times, but through prayer and the sacrificial hearts of likeminded Christians, we have been blessed to continue in our efforts to broaden the Kingdom and bring glory to GOD our Father from whom all blessings flow! To keep all of our supporters informed, we are providing our 2019 Financial Report. In addition to the numbers, below are some highlights of how each of you have impacted the needs of our brethren in Latin America, as well as some current and continual needs.

Children of America's Christmas:

Our annual Christmas shopping is one of the most anticipated events of the year! So much joy can be seen both from the giving side and the receiving side. Your generous 2019 giving was \$7,371.51! We do not know what the Christmas will look like this year as far as the shopping trip goes, but with your continued support we will still be having Christmas for the kids!

Fund Raising Plea 2020

As reflected in the financial numbers for 2019, we found ourselves in a crunch this year. The campaigns unfortunately had to be cancelled, therefore our missionaries found themselves having some extra time to address our money issues. Phone calls and personal visits were made, and we have been able to raise \$125,214.31 to cover the deficit and help us through 2020. We would be remiss if we did not stop and recognize the faithful brethren who "dug deep" into their pockets to cover the deficits.

Children's Home Meals

In addition to the \$5,386.00 raised during the 2019 financial period, we sent out a special plea in March of this year to help with food for the Children's Home. From this plea alone, \$18,020.16 has been sent in! Can we all say "Amen"! The monthly food budget for the CH averages \$3,500/month. Having dedicated funds to cover the meals not only helps out with food costs but also helps to offset the overall monthly budget. Please mark your support as "CH Meals".

New Oven for Children's Home

A new industrial sized oven was needed for the CH kitchen at a total cost of \$3,250.00. The stove was purchased and paid for in full by donations received in November, 2019. Thank you!

Security Fence for the Campus

(Bible School of Americas and Children's Home)
In June of 2019, we sent out a letter expressing the security issues that have been experienced on campus with a request to help raise \$160,000.00 to install a security fence and road around the campus. We have received \$107,168.84 to date (\$80,937.00 for the 2019 fiscal year). We have consulted with the builders on ways to reduce the parameters and cost of the security fence from the initial estimate. We were set to begin the site work about the time the shutdown began due to COVID-19. Currently, we are on hold but have plans to start as soon as the government permits.

SPECIFIC NEEDS

Bible School of Americas Student Scholarships

The Bible School of the Americas (BSA) is the foundation of Latin American Missions. We currently have 15 students at the school for the two year program. A very conservative cost per student is \$1,500.00/month. Realistically, the cost is higher. Student tuitions cover the cost of the schooling, instructors, housing, transportation.

The need for student scholarships and support of the BSA is enormous!

We want to urge our brethren to speak to their local Eldership about supporting one student at the school. We will be happy to supply your congregation with a specific student's name so you may be praying for him and his family if he is a married student. Also, we can send reports to keep you updated on his progress.

Children's Home of the Americas


