

y first trip to the Bible School of the Americas in Panama was as part of a mission team from the Graymere Church of Christ in 2005. With the exception of the Pandemic year, I have been every year since where I teach and coordinate Leadership classes for the students and local church leaders. Officially, I became a part-time missionary with LAM in 2010, focusing on Future Minister Camps which train young men to lead in the Church and teaching at the Bible School of the Americas. My BSAM courses have been Leadership, Youth and Family Ministry, and the book of Revelation.

he students at BSAM have been amazing over the years. Many young men who attended a Future Minister Camp later became my students at the Bible School. Many graduates have helped to begin and coordinate Future Minister Camps across Latin America. Personally, I attended leadership and ministry training camps years ago while in high school, and it was at one of these camps that I decided to devote my life to preaching the Gospel. I have participated in as many as six camps in a single year. In addition to 23 years of full-time work and another ten years of part-time ministry in local congregations, I taught in the Bible Department for eight years at Freed-Hardeman University. Currently, I am in my fourth year as Professor/President at Heritage Christian University. Also, I have taught courses at the Columbia Bible Institute and Amridge University. Training leaders in the Church is part of my DNA. It is the air that I breathe. Many people have invested in me, and I have the responsibility to pass it on.

So, it was very natural for me to develop a passion for God's work at the Bible School of the Americas. For many years Jack Farber has been a mentor, encourager, and friend to me and countless others. In particular, he has poured his whole heart and life into Latin America and the Bible School. His heart beats with a Latin beat. He has been loved and respected by the students, the staff, the faculty, and their families. The school would not be where it is

today without him! His life blood has flowed through the veins of that campus! He is one of a kind, and I smile when I think of the reception that Jack and Nancy will have in heaven one day because of all they have done for the cause of Christ.

As Jack moves toward retirement, the Elders asked if I would consider taking on part of the work. I have a large job at Heritage, so being the main Director of BSAM was not an option. But, that is unnecessary because the school already has an outstanding Director, my friend Agenor Rudas. He will continue to run day to day operations on the campus in Panama. I will serve as the Academic Director and oversee curriculum development, teaching assignments, and continuing education for the professors and alumni. Together, we will work side by side under the direction of the Forrest Park Elders.

Agenor, the faculty, and I have already met by Zoom, and we will continue planning in the coming months as one academic year ends in December and another one begins in February. We are ready to wrestle with the following:

- 1. What does a student need to know or be prepared for before graduation?
- 2. What classes will best prepare them for graduation?
- 3. What classes are our BSAM and U.S. based teachers best qualified to teach?
- 4. How should we best schedule class rotations?
- 5. How do we rotate in short courses taught by teachers from the U.S. so that it fits their schedules, but we do not interrupt classes on campus?
- 6. How can we prepare a continuing education program for our teachers and graduates?
- 7. How do we strengthen our relationships with our graduates?
- 8. How do we improve training for students' wives and for potential female students ( within the confines of Biblical roles in the church)?


We are equally excited that Austin Fowler has accepted the challenge of being

It is wonderful to be back in the mission field after a hiatus due to the pandemic. My friend, Chuck Morris, and I started working with Future Minister Camps in the United States and Latin America in January 2010 (Panama). Since that time, God has planted camps in eleven different countries in Latin America and two different locations in Brazil. Mexico is the eleventh country. The other countries are Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala, Dominican Republic, Peru, and Colombia. We tried to start a camp in Mexico last year, but had to cancel because of COVID. Praise the Lord we were able to plant the camp this year!

The camps focus on training young men of ages 12-24 to lead in the church (though we have had younger and much older campers to participate). We work with local Christians to train the campers in leadership, being elders, personal evangelism, creating lessons, leading in worship, and more. We bring very few people from the States with us because our goal is not to do a camp for them but to do it with them and to teach them how to do it on their own. I regularly take experienced brothers with me from other Latin American countries. Francisco González, who teaches at the BSAM in Panama, is helping with the camp in Mexico. Simeon Vazquez and



Rafael Paguaga, also teachers at the school, helped with our camp in the Dominican Republic. We work with each country for a year or two and then

move on to another country.

Campers in Mexico prepared lessons from characters in the books of Luke and Acts. We had 27 campers this time. An added pleasure was two of the leaders in the camp, Domingo Pérez and Jaime Montejo, were former students at BSAM that I had the pleasure of teaching. The local Christians, including preachers, Church leaders, and an army of ladies who prepare food and so much more, sacrifice and work tirelessly to make the camp possible. The boys sleep on the floor in the church building or in hammocks in sweltering Mexican jungle. They are completely committed to being leaders for the Lord.

Prahn is a 14 year old boy who lives about 2 1/2 hours away from Palenque. His parents

were helping with the camp. He was not planning to attend until Chuck Morris encouraged him. It is hard to say, "No," to Chuck. The boys get up each night to practice speaking. Brahn was so scared to get up the first night that he started crying. The other boys



quickly jumped into encouragement mode. He spoke in front of the group the next day like he had always been doing it. It is amazing what a little training and encouragement can do! Heaven only knows how the Lord might use him in the future. Thank you to all the churches and individuals who make this work possible. ### Why I Knock on Doors

It was early 2016 when we received a phone call from my good friend, Miranda Smith. She had been on a mission trip with LAM to La Fortuna, Costa Rica in 2015 and thought about us the whole time she was there. My congregation is on the Mexican border and we have many bilingual members. Miranda was calling to invite us to Central America because she knew that being bilingual would make us great assets. She didn't know that I had always dreamed of going on a mission trip but didn't know where or how to get started. With the support from my congregation, family, and friends, I have now been on four LAM campaigns.

love this work because I love people. This makes these challenging campaigns easy. My primary



work is translating during Bible studies. When we're door knocking and I first meet someone, I want them to know how excited we are to meet them. Even though I'm a foreigner, doors easily open to form relationships and share the Gospel, because I

speak their language. Notably, this opened the door to have Bible studies with our bus drivers from Costa Rica and Peru. During the first couple of days of every trip, there is a friendly rivalry between the evangelism teams to see who can get a Bible study with their bus driver first.

t is wonderful to meet brothers and sisters from the U.S. and foreign countries and work together for a week with a shared purpose...to spread the Gospel. While each trip is a little different, every campaign carries an eternal weight of importance and is immensely enriching to everyone involved. I have met some of the best people in the world on these trips. On my first trip to Nicaragua, I met a family that wanted to study with us. We walked through a street-turned-river to get to their house.



We still keep in touch. On the second trip to Nicaragua, I became good friends with a local preacher's wife. She is a sweet sister whom I cherish very much. On my third trip, the church in Costa Rica spoiled us with their hospitality as we worked long days, sometimes having to walk in the rain. In Peru, I met the sweetest brothers and sisters in the faith, all hard workers for the Kingdom.

This work is life-changing, especially to young people. It opens their eyes to see their true purpose in life as Christ-followers. I have been blessed to have my son, Marc, join me on the mission trips. I know it has impacted his life. If you know me, then I have probably already invited you to join us on the next campaign. I started going to church because someone knocked on my door to share the Gospel when I was ten. My life was changed forever. We continue to go door-knocking regularly. *That's why I knock on doors!* 





## The American

The Church of Christ in the United States is dying. Unless there is a cultural shift among congregations to focus on local evangelism, there will be no congregations for our children and grand-children to attend. Brethren line up for foreign mission trips and spend countless dollars to go overseas, but when faced with evangelizing their local communities, workers are few and resources are scarce. Brethren, this must change!

Beginning on July 24<sup>th</sup>, we conducted our first American Mission Campaign, a combined work of Latin American Missions and the House to House/Heart to Heart School of Evangelism. Our goal was to duplicate in the U.S. what we do all over the world. We assembled a team of Christians to work for six days in Rome, GA to train workers and teach the gospel. When evangelizing in foreign countries, a simple invitation to a tent meeting can produce dozens of contacts. This does not work in the United States. Therefore, we attempted a different approach.

irst, we armed every participant with the tools needed to effectively evangelize the lost. We cannot expect our soldiers to fight unarmed without the weapons needed to win. Contributions made by congregations and individuals enabled us to provide every worker with an AMC backpack full of door hangers, tracts, contact cards, study methods, House to House/Heart to Heart, bookmarks, and training manuals/books.

Second, we spent almost 25 hours in training Christians how to evangelize. Most congregations have an army of untrained soldiers. Some still try to conduct campaigns like churches did during the 1950-60's, but no training is given as Christians are sent to the streets with meeting flyers and Bibles. This is a failing model in 2021, and it results in discouragement. AMC has an adaptive approach to our changing culture that has resulted in a 35 percent

success rate for gaining a contact for return visits.

Third, we set realistic goals. Many local campaign efforts end in "failure" because the expectations are not Biblical. We do not come to baptize but to teach. The Great Commission is a reach and teach order. Jesus said we must look up as the fields are white unto harvest. (John 4:35) Bringing the love of the Church of Christ to every door in the community will bring results.

ourth, we followed the teachings of Christ by forming contacts using kindness, gentleness, and love to till the soils of the heart. We bring these gifts in the name of the Lord to show compassion to those in need and to offer healing to those who hurt. By using the New Testament tools of benevolence, prayer, and simple gospel teaching, we appeal to those who are looking for answers to religious hypocrisy and division.

ifth, we practice what we preach! Since beginning HTHSOE three years ago, we have recorded almost 900 baptisms. We take the working model of the New Testament and demonstrate its power by practicing it all over the United States. We send out weekly reports (*Reaching the Lost*) to encourage and keep everyone accountable. We seek cultural changes that produce lasting results.

n Rome, Georgia, the spirit of evangelism was evident as an army of Christian soldiers were trained and hundreds of contacts were made for congregations to prospect and engage in Bible study. On Sunday we baptized two who were visiting. Thousands of doors were knocked. The United States of America is a fertile field, but Satan has convinced us that America cannot be reached, so we do not try. Satan lost this battle as we fought for the Lord.

Because of COVID-19, there were no mission trips to Latin America this summer. However, LAM partnered with Rob Whitacre and the House to House School of Evangelism to create the American Mission Campaign or AMC. To simply report, American Mission Campaign was a huge success! It was both a door knocking campaign and an evangelism seminar. All week, participants knocked doors during the mornings, not to set up quick Bible studies like we do in Latin America, but with a sole purpose of getting a contact. Once we got a contact, we then turned it into a prospect by building a relationship with them. Hopefully, that prospect will lead to a Bible study.

uring the first two days, we door knocked in areas where the Oak Hill church was already

sending copies of *House to House*. There was a lot of good feedback about the mailer. On the third day, we used the benevolence method. We simply asked people how we could help them. A lot of people asked for help with their yard work, providing food, or helping with different projects around the house. Using this method, we made a lot of great contacts. On the last day of door knocking we handed out new mover baskets to newcomers in the

Rome area. We used the "How can I pray for you?" method at the door. It was great to see that door knocking still works in America!

n the afternoons, Rob trained everyone with successful evangelism strategies. The lessons taught how to use *Back to the Bible* and *Believe the Bible*. He also taught us how to answer difficult questions about family, baptism, and instrumental music. Everyone who attended this week was encouraged, edified, and went home with a new outlook on evangelism.

vangelism still works here in our own country. The key is to have the proper strategies, realistic expectations, and be willing to put it to practice. This is just the beginning of American Mission Campaigns, and we cannot be more excited for the future!
